COMMITTEE MEMBERS PRESENT: Danny Hardee Chairman; Gary Loftus and Orton Bellamy

MEMBERS ABSENT: Al Allen

In accordance with the FOIA, notices of the meeting were provided to the press stating the time, date, and place of the meeting.

CALL TO ORDER: Chairman Hardee called the meeting to order at approximately 9:00 a.m.

INVOCATION: Councilman Bellamy gave the invocation.

PUBLIC INPUT: None

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA CONTENTS: Mr. Loftus moved to approve with a second from Mr. Bellamy and the vote was unanimous.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES – January 27, 2020: Mr. Bellamy moved to approve the minutes for January 27, 2020 as submitted. The vote was unanimous.

RESOLUTIONS:

Resolution of Appreciation and Recognition for Matt McGuire for his Service to Horry County as an ARES Ham Radio Operator and President of the Grand Strand Amateur Radio Club: Mr. Randy Webster stated the resolution was to recognize Matt McGuire for his dedication and work that he had provided free of charge as one of the County's amateur radio operators. He had been assisting since the late nineties. He had been instrumental in getting the County caught up to date and involved with the ham radio community and training. When the Emergency Operations Center was activated, they would show up to help there and with other EOC's and communities. He added he would like to present it at the next Council meeting if possible. **Mr. Hardee moved to approve with a second from Mr. Bellamy and the vote was unanimous.**

Resolution to Submit and Accept, if Awarded, a Grant for HCPD for the Hiring of a Narcotics Detective: Chief Hill explained that the proposed resolution would be for a specialty detective for the unit. They would serve as a liaison between the homicide division and the drug unit. They were going after drug dealers that were killing people in the community. There was a push in South Carolina from the Attorney General's office to go after drug dealers related to overdoses resulting in death. The detective would gather intel and assist the homicide investigation for death related overdoses. **Mr. Bellamy moved to approve and the vote was unanimous.**

Resolution to Submit and Accept, if Awarded, a Grant for HCPD for Continued Support of Two (2)

Domestic Violence Detectives: Chief Hill explained the proposed resolution was for continued support for the victim's advocates program. There was some concern about reducing funds for the program and they were trying to work through that. **Mr. Bellamy moved to approve and the vote was unanimous.**

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

Outstanding Safety Achievement Award HCFR: Mr. Randy Webster commented that the award was a really nice recognition that he hoped could be presented to the Council. Chief Tanner explained that the previous week the South Carolina Association of Counties had recognized Horry County Fire and Rescue for a measure that they had put out by using portable speed bumps. He described an accident that had prompted them to initiate the use of the speed bumps at accident / fire scenes. They could be rolled up and kept in the fire truck. They were yellow and black and were placed in the street around the fire trucks. They had used them several times and had been a tremendous help in slowing traffic down. The plan was to expand the program to every piece of apparatus in the County. Some of the busier roads would require two sets. They were about \$350.00 per set but was very inexpensive if it could keep someone from being hit. The State Association of Counties had recognized the benefit and they had also received calls from all over the country from people reaching out to find what they were doing and how they were doing it.

Fire Department Update: Chief Tanner presented several slides showing stats for the fourth quarter of 2019. He noted that they had finished 2019 with 63,267 calls. There were 54,311 EMS calls and 8,956 fire calls and they were running about 350 calls ahead of the same time last year. He referred to a slide that showed incidents by month. He noted that previously in the winter and fall months call volume decreased but recently there was not as much of a decrease.

In April they had the Career Recruit Class 39 which had been one of their largest groups until the one they had just started in January. They also had two volunteer groups back to back in April and July.

They had also received a SAFER grant and he thanked the committee for helping to move the request forward. It allowed the County to hire an additional 30 firefighters. They had received 504 applicants, which broke all records in Horry County's Fire / Rescue's history. It was a process but they had selected 30 and they were expected to graduate sometime in June. The majority of them were local with no training whatsoever. They would be trained to the Firefighter II level, driver/ operator, haz-mat and basic EMT. Mr. Loftus asked how long the SAFER grant would be active and Chief Tanner stated it was a three-year grant. They were covering 25% per year with monies from the Fire Fund.

Some of the things they had done in the community during the last quarter included a new program called Hands-only CPR and one called Stop the Bleed. The previous week they had seen approximately 1500 people at the P2P event (Pathways to Possibilities Program).

Social media was proving to be a valuable tool and they didn't even know what it was a few years ago. He shared the story about a horse that had gotten stuck in a hayloft. The Fire / Rescue was called and they responded with their technical rescue team. They also called a horse rescue team from North Carolina to assist. The Associated Press picked up the post and sent it out nationally including the New York Times, Washington Post and other national media outlets. He added that 470,000 people read the post and it was the most interesting calls he had ever responded to. He noted they had 21,832 followers on Facebook and 9,520 followers on Twitter.

The department had realized they had to find a better way to manage their operations. They had reached out to a company called D4H that provided real time incident management. During their discussions, they found out that the State used them in their Specialty teams through SLED. They were now partnered with SLED and used the program every day. All of their forms, tasks, logs, maps and status boards were now on an IPAD. It gave them true documentation that was live at the time for FEMA reimbursements. They also used it for large events like bike weeks and during the last hurricane. Prior to this, everything was handwritten on a dry erase board. The program had paid great dividends for them.

He commented on the new battalion chief's vehicles they had recently purchased and noted they were now in service. All four of the units were identical so each vehicle would have the same equipment. Command operations were on a slide out board on the back and were set up so that if all the trucks were pulled together they would have 8-10 workstations. They enabled quicker, easier deployment at emergency scenes.

They were awarded the Gold Plus EMS Recognition for STEMI care from the AHA. It was the fifth time HCFR had been recognized but this was their first Gold Plus award. They had installed over 2,100 smoke alarms in 2019. They did these once a quarter in four different areas of the County. Every battalion did a smoke alarm blitz one day in every quarter. He also listed some of the Community Engagement Events they promoted with the most recent one spending an afternoon helping at the Shepherd's table.

Police Department Update: Chief Hill asked Kelly Moore to bring up their media page so that everyone could see some of the things they had going on. The display showed a snapshot of the previous year's successes for the agency. Like the Fire/Rescue Department, they also had a record number of calls for service that was attributed to the explosive growth in the County. The display showed several stats one of which was the number of officers in the agency. That number was 246, which left them with only four vacancies in the agency and they hoped to be closing in on zero soon. He attributed that to the support from Council and Administration plus the officers were staying longer. The attrition rate had been cut more than half. Community events numbered more than 500 and was critical to their exposure and connection to the community. Some of the other stats showed service area covered, population and miles traveled.

They were currently working on a new software program for enhanced crime analytics that would allow them to do link and predictive analysis. They had requested a crime analyst to help manage that in their budget.

They had also launched Cop Logic, an online program, for citizens to submit reports that did not require a police officer to go out. They started it out with big businesses like Wal Mart but had expanded it to the schools and to the general public.

They had consolidated the Animal Care Center and Environmental Officers Unit. They had a Lieutenant over the Center and had great success with the changes. They had a pet adoption event the previous Saturday at Conway Ford and when he arrived about two hours into it, all of the dogs except for two had been adopted. He also noted that the next day the Governor would be presenting Misty Gore, one of the animal service officers, an award. She had taken it upon herself to investigate an animal cruelty case, which resulted in an arrest. She would be recognized by the Humane Society of America.

Some other positives he noted was the homicide rate had been cut by 50% over the last five years. The last two years there were twenty-three homicides and last year there were only ten. Burglaries and

robberies were down as well as violent crime as a whole was down. He attributed it to partnerships with Federal partners and the hard work by the men and women of the Horry County Police Department.

Back to the social media page, he noted it had been a great asset for them and was a definite boost to connecting with the community. Also on the social media page was another event they were connected to. It was a Sensory Awareness for special needs kids. It was the brainchild of Capt. Harrelson. They had asked the public to help them getting the kits so that each officer would have one in their cars. The public had been a tremendous help, Mikayla had been working with local media and several of the local companies had reached out to help. Each officer would have a sensory awareness kit in their vehicle and any extras would be shared with the Fire Department.

Another big event they had participated in was "A Night to Shine" and Capt. Harrelson had helped with the event as well. Several of the Detectives attended and participated in the event that included traffic enforcement and actually dancing and being partners with some of the attendees.

They were up to 42,000 followers on Facebook and 10,400 followers on Twitter. An interesting note was that a lot of the followers did not live in Horry County but they "followed" the County. They received a lot of support from other areas and it was rewarding for them to know the public recognized everything they were doing for their community.

ADJOURNMENT: With no further business, Mr. Bellamy moved to adjourn at approximately 9:26 a.m. The motion was unanimously passed.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC. 5-22 OF CHAPTER 5 (BEACHES), HORRY COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES, SO AS TO PROVIDE FOR STANDARDS FOR THE INFANT CABANA EXCEPTION TO THE PROHIBITION OF TENTS ALONG THE BEACHES IN UNINCORPORATED HORRY COUNTY

WHEREAS, on May 17, 2011, County Council enacted Ordinance 27-11 providing for the regulation of activities on the beaches located within the unincorporated area of Horry County; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 27-11 has been codified and appears as Chapter 5 of the Horry County Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-22(c) of Chapter 5 addresses the use and location of shading devices such as umbrellas and tents; and

WHEREAS, on April 15, 2014, Council enacted Ordinance 19-14, providing specifically for regulation of tents along the beaches in the unincorporated area of the County; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2015, Council enacted Ordinance 10-15, providing, among other things, for an exception to the prohibition of tents and similar devices along the beach: “small pop up or blow up cabanas for infants and very small children”; and

WHEREAS, Council believes that it has become necessary to further define “small pop up or blow up cabanas” so that such regulation is clear and is applied uniformly.

NOW, THEREFORE, by the power and authority granted to the Horry County Council by the Constitution of the State of South Carolina and the powers granted to the County by the General Assembly of the State, the following hereby is ordained and enacted:

1. CODE AMENDMENT. Subsection (c) of Section 5-22 of Chapter 5, Horry County Code of Ordinances, is hereby modified as follows (words crossed through indicate deletions, words underlined indicate additions):

(c) *Shading devices.* Shading devices, other than circular umbrellas with a circular shade no greater than seven feet six inches (7’6”) in diameter, shall not be allowed on the beach. This includes, but is not limited to, tents, tarps, cabanas, pavilions, sports-brellas, or similar devices, or any material mounted on supports, but does not include small pop up or blow up cabanas for infants and very small children. Small pop up or blow up cabanas may not be larger than four feet (4’) wide, three feet (3’) deep, and three feet (3’) high. An umbrella is defined as a collapsible circular shade consisting of a natural or synthetic fabric shade stretched over hinged ribs radiating from a central pole without grounding lines or ropes. All shading devices are prohibited from being tied, bound, joined, or connected in any manner, but otherwise shall be secured in such fashion to restrict uncontrolled movement of the device.

Tents or tent like structures may be permitted on the beach as part of weddings or other organized events; provided, however, that such activities are subject to the special event permitting provisions of section 13-34, article III, chapter 13 of the Horry County Code of Ordinances. Consideration of fee waiver or reduction may be given for wedding events, under section 13-34(l).

2. SEVERABILITY. If any Section, Subsection, or part of this Ordinance shall be deemed or found to conflict with a provision of South Carolina law, or other pre-emptive legal principle, then that Section, Sub-section or part of this Ordinance shall be deemed ineffective, but the remaining parts of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

3. CONFLICT WITH PRECEDING ORDINANCES. If a Section, Sub-section or provision of this Ordinance shall conflict with the provisions of a Section, Sub-section or part of a preceding Ordinance of Horry County, unless expressly so providing, then the preceding Section, Sub-section or part shall be deemed repealed and no longer in effect.

4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall become effective on Third Reading.

Re: Resolution to submit and accept if awarded a grant for the continued full-time salary of three (3) advocates and one (1) Coordinator – Victim Advocates Program

ISSUE

The approval of the attached Resolution, to submit and accept, if awarded, a grant to support continued full-time funding for three (3) advocates and one (1) coordinator for the Horry County Police Department's (HCPD) Victim Advocates Program.

BACKGROUND

In South Carolina, the primary purpose of Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funding is to support the provision of direct services to victims of crime. For the last four years, the HCPD has employed three grant-funded full-time Victim Advocates, supported through the South Carolina VOCA program, to assist victims of crime in Horry County. A fourth Victim Advocate is supported by the HCPD, providing one advocate per precinct. In 2018, a successful application to the VOCA program resulted in the hiring of an additional grant-funded position, to serve as coordinator for the advocates and to strengthen linkages with other government and non-profit sector offices for provision of other needed services to crime victims. Each year, the HCPD Victim Services Unit serves approximately 6,000 victims of crimes such as sexual assault, robbery, harassment, aggravated assault, homicide, and more.

The funding agency is the South Carolina Office of the Attorney General, Department of Crime Victim Assistance. The VOCA program specifically seeks applications for the continued support of advocates as part of the U.S. Victims of Crime Act, signed into law on October 12, 1984. The total grant request will not exceed \$250,000 to fund salaries, fringe benefits, training and office supplies.

The grant does not require the County to maintain the position after grant funds have expired. The match requirement is \$60,000 and will be an in-kind match consisting of salary support of other continuing HCPD employees who devote a percentage of their time to victim advocacy.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests the Public Safety Committee recommend to Council the approval of the attached Resolution approving the submission and acceptance, if awarded, of the SC Office of the Attorney General's VOCA grant.



HCPD Calls for Service February 2020 (Council Districts)





February 2020 (8,327)







