COMMITTEE MEMBERS PRESENT: Danny Hardee Chairman; Gary Loftus and Orton Bellamy

MEMBERS ABSENT: Al Allen

OTHERS PRESENT: Steve Gosnell; Pat Hartley; Arrigo Carotti; Kelly Moore; Randy Webster; Councilman Bill Howard; Chief Hill; Chief Tanner; David Gilreath; and Mary Mauch.

In accordance with the FOIA, notices of the meeting were provided to the press stating the time, date, and place of the meeting.

CALL TO ORDER: Chairman Hardee called the meeting to order at approximately 9:00 a.m.

INVOCATION: Chairman Hardee gave the invocation.

PUBLIC INPUT: None

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA CONTENTS: Mr. Bellamy moved to approve with a second from Mr. Loftus and the vote was unanimous.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: – August 11, 2020: Mr. Bellamy moved to approve the minutes for August 11, 2020 as submitted with a second from Mr. Loftus. The motion was unanimously passed.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

Reckless Discharge of Firearms: Mr. Randy Webster noted that at the last meeting, they had been asked to come back to update them on whether they could use the current ordinance or if there were revisions that could be added to address the concerns. Chief Hill and his staff had been working with the Solicitor's office and he requested an update from the Chief.

Chief Hill stated that he had worked with the Solicitor's office as well as the County Attorney on how to improve the current ordinance. There was currently a suggestion on the table to charge the landowner that allowed permission for people to shoot on their property. After talking to the Solicitor's office, they decided that would be problematic for them. He noted that Mr. Carotti wanted to do a complete re-write of the current ordinance so there needed to be further discussion.

One of the things they wanted to highlight was a clear definition of reckless discharge. It had proven difficult for officers to pin down what constituted "reckless discharge" and it would help them if they had some clear guidelines.

Mr. Loftus understood the difficulty that the Police Department faced but he had constituents that had bullet holes in their houses. He noted it was difficult talking to them when all he could tell them was that there wasn't really anything they could do about it. Chief Hill explained that he knew the case Mr. Loftus was talking about and they had paid them a visit and made the effort to find out who the shooter was. There were multiple shooters, multiple locations and multiple times involved. It was difficult to actually pin down who fired the gun. They were able to negotiate with the property owner to change the direction of the range so that it was more towards the vegetative swamp area. That seemed to solve the issue with the exception of the noise. Mr. Loftus thanked him for working on it. Chief Hill stated they cared about the citizens of Horry County and they were doing the best they could with the tools they had. The question that remained was "who pulled the trigger?"

Mr. Carotti asked what the Committee wanted him to do. Mr. Hardee noted that Chief Hill had touched on it, but referring to the current ordinance, if they could get the Police to work with the Solicitor's office so that they could prosecute and have a clear definition of reckless discharge, the police would have a tool they could work with. Chief Hill reminded them they would still have to go back to the core issue of "who fired the shot?"

Mr. Carotti commented that he felt for the police officers that were being looked upon to solve the issue and not having the tools, time, and again to do it. He also noted he had also watched it happen since 2011 when he first came to the County. He mentioned that he had previously been a trial attorney and to be able to define reckless would not work. One could go page after page and still not think of every conceivable instance that would fit the definition of reckless. He felt that he had given the best he could come up with in the past ten years. If the issue was to be solved, it would take a dramatic effort. He did not feel the tools were there for the police and that they could not be defined under the current ordinance. He added that the landowner could be held responsible but the Solicitor's office did not prosecute ordinance violations. He really did not know what else to offer other than providing zones in the area. The whole County would not be blanketed under the same ordinance when it was apparent that the western part of the County was nothing like the eastern part in terms of population density. The people could vote on the issue in a certain area and would need more than 50% in favor of the ordinance. There would have to be a long list of exceptions to satisfy Second Amendment rights. People would not be prohibited from using firearms correctly, but if there was a majority of people in a certain area that didn't want that to happen in their neighborhood then there was a precedent for that. He added that the seven of the eight municipalities in the County already had that in place. For instance, one could not step outside and discharge a firearm because it was against a Conway ordinance. The seven municipalities with an ordinance stated a person could not discharge a firearm within the municipality. There were exceptions for hunters on certain acreage.

Mr. Hardee noted again that you just could not fix stupid. Mr. Carotti stated as an example that they had to tell people they were required to fasten their seat belt and no exceptions if going under a certain speed. People understood black and white and there had to be an understanding that if they refused, they would be charged. It was the same thing with reckless discharge of firearms. Too many exceptions and variables made it difficult to enforce.

Mr. Loftus stated that he hoped that they didn't have a tragedy to provide an impetus for getting something done.

Mr. Bellamy asked if the majority of the calls were about people who operated shooting ranges or about individuals who were randomly firing a weapon.

Chief Hill stated that most of the calls were from people in the surrounding communities about fireworks calls, shooting in the distance and noise complaints. They seldom received calls where a round had hit a tree in a yard or someone's house. Mr. Loftus thanked them for working on the problem. Chief Hill stated that they were doing the best that they could, they did care about the protection and safety of the citizens and they were using every tool available to them.

Mr. Loftus was interested in the zone option and asked if that could be done.

Mr. Carotti stated that he had worked on that so that they did not blanket cover the entire County and he did believe that it would be permissible constitutionally. He would be able to borrow from other sections of the law like the fireworks prohibited zone as well as laws for special tax districts. He explained the process to pass the ordinance would require that over 50% of the resident electorate would have to sign a petition. It would be at the discretion of County Council just like establishing a special tax district and would establish that particular area as a discharge prohibitive zone.

Emergency Management Update: Mr. Randy Webster stated they had submitted their exercise and training program update to the State as required. He noted they were having certain issues due to Covid like everyone else that involved face-to-face interactions. They had also just wrapped up public review of the Hazards / Mitigation Plan. It was a five-year update required by FEMA in order to receive mitigation funding after a

disaster. They expected it to reach FEMA by the end of the year or maybe earlier but with Covid, FEMA was running behind. It would not affect funds when or if they were needed.

As to the new facility, they had received several bids and were reviewing them. So far, everything was on track.

He presented a slide showing how they had designed the EOC to accommodate mitigation for Covid. He pointed out all the plexiglass that was up and how each workstation was arranged. He commented that John Barnhill and his staff had done a great job.

His next point of discussion was concerning hurricane season. There was currently some activity off the coast that could possibly develop in the next few days. More than likely, there would be some minor impacts with wind and rain but he did not expect any major activity. He mentioned a couple of other ones further out and commented that we had already reached the "R" (Rene) at the first of September, which was unusual. The peak of the season was September 10 and he was confident that everyone was prepared for any activity. There would be another peak around October 1-15 and should hopefully start winding down shortly after.

911 Update: Ms. Renee Hardwick noted that they currently had five vacancies but were in the process of filling the vacancies with a projected hire date of October 12. After training, they should be ready to go by around Thanksgiving. She also noted that they were three weeks Covid free. They had worked very hard on keeping everyone healthy. She also added that October 1 would be their 30th anniversary with 911 in Horry County. Due to Covid, there would not be the usual celebration, but she hoped to do something virtual and to put something out with the media.

Fire Update: Chief Tanner first wanted to thank all the employees for all the work they had been doing during Covid and noted how crazy things had been.

He presented a slide showing January – August phone calls noting they were approximately 1,000 calls down from last year. For 2020, there were a little over 42,000 calls and they treated many of the calls as Covid related calls based on info given to them by 911 operators. They found out that many of the patients had no symptoms and it would be about three days later they would get a call from the hospital that the patient was Covid positive. At that point, the requirement for the employees changed to wearing full PPE the whole time and was still the current policy.

He then presented a slide that showed the Covid related calls noting July 4 had a record number of calls totaling 292 for that one day. Since the beginning of the pandemic, they had 42,807 patient contacts. There had been very limited exposures and very few employees that had tested positive. He explained the disinfecting procedures they followed on the vehicles and at the stations after every call. He stated they had temporarily cancelled all public interaction events, offered live streaming on Facebook for graduation ceremonies and had graduated 43 employees in June. He noted there was limited attendance due to social distancing.

He mentioned the fire at Ocean Lakes on July 31 and praised the response from each area noting it could have been a catastrophic event. There were four completely destroyed buildings and ten buildings damaged but no one was hurt. Mr. Loftus added that all of the management at Ocean Lakes had been in touch with him to let him know what an awesome job the fire department had done and to express their appreciation.

They also helped in Ocean Isle Beach that had major hurricane damage. They were there most of the night on August 4 and again on August 6. He showed slides from both fires noting they were high profile fires.

He showed slides from a couple of major rescue operations from a boat accident with injuries and a building collapse with someone trapped underneath.

He stated that their Facebook followers had increased to 26,449 with 5,614 so far in 2020. Twitter followers was at 10,200 with 680 so far in 2020.

They had implemented D4H, which was a real time incident management software. He and Mr. Carotti had spent a lot of time on the phone with the developers. The developers had contracted with SLED to implement a management software program that the Fire Department was able to test during Hurricane Florence and had found that it worked very well. They were using it now pretty much on a daily basis. It was used for all holiday weekends, special events and hurricanes.

It was also used for employee testing. They had 280 applications for their last 15 job openings and tested about 100 applicants initially. Their next recruit class was scheduled for September 14th and at that point, they would have no vacancies.

He discussed peak load units and boat patrols, which ran usually from Memorial Day and finished up around Labor Day. He spoke about their schedules and how busy they were and how the boat patrols responded to boaters in trouble. They were a much appreciated addition to the regular units and were funded by ATAX monies.

He discussed HCFR Weather stations that they now had in nine locations around the County and displayed a slide showing where each of them were located. They would help in trying to determine the weather in each location around the entire County. The goal was to complete this in all forty locations within County fire reach. It would give them live real time information all over the County. Mr. Loftus noted that there didn't seem to be any right along the coast. Chief Tanner stated that there would be eventually and would include Myrtle Beach Fire, Surfside Beach Fire and North Myrtle Beach already had some on the coast area.

He stated that they had been fortunate to have received two FEMA grants since the last meeting. One was to put exhaust ventilation systems for their cancer prevention programs in all of their career stations. That grant was approximately \$900,000. They also received a grant for PPE for the Covid response and that would help them to replenish their supply.

Police Update: Chief Hill first wanted to thank the Council and Public Safety partners for their support when they lost one of their officers, Corp. Michael Ambrosino, to Covid -19. It was a very emotional time for everyone within the Police Dept. and they really appreciated all the support.

Their current vacancy rate was at twenty-five due to the grant they had received. They were challenged to find the people to fill the grant because of Covid-19. Part of the grant requirements was to hire Veterans but they could not get onto the bases due to Covid. They had a company that was going to advertise on behalf of the Police Department that would reach out to some of the bases. Another challenge for them was the police academy. They had a group of academy recruits waiting for almost eleven months but finally had them a class date within the next week or so. He explained that they did put them to work sometimes in other areas of the County. The academy was doing the best they could under Covid restrictions and it was just something they currently had to live with.

He next spoke about LexisNexis. The previous year they had reached out and interviewed several different companies for an additional software package for the department. Their precinct commanders, analysts and command staff would use it. It was one of the best products they had seen. They had purchased it and were just beginning their training. Once the training was complete, he would be glad to roll it out for everyone to see how it worked. It would allow them to do predictive analysis on crime trends, narrow down problem areas in the County and give them the ability to strategically place their resources in those areas.

He then spoke about the LPR system and thanked the committee for providing the funding. The hard part would be the RFP process and identifying the company that would provide the LPR's with the price / funding they currently had available. He was confident they would find the right system and integrate it with the State system. It was not just a license plate reader. It would help them track offenders, suspects and keep an eye on the County. He referred to the body cam he was wearing and noted there was a rumor that Axon might integrate that technology with the LPR system. If so, then the Axon systems in the cruisers could also act as a LPR as well.

He spoke about the equipment they needed for the officers. Currently there was a shortage of vehicles and he noted it was also a nationwide shortage. He had worked with fleet management personnel to retrofit older cruisers in order to get them on the street for the fifteen new hires they were expecting.

Sheriff Update: Chief Fox commented that he was glad they were through the busy season and that summer was over. He stated they had their staff working Labor Day assisting other agencies working the Myrtle Beach corridor Thursday through Sunday. They had made several arrests and had made use of Myrtle Beach's LPR system tagging stolen vehicles and stolen license plates. They had recovered some guns, marijuana and other drugs. They were maintaining numbers at the jail and currently had about 680. He thanked Chief Hill and all the other law enforcement agencies in the County for helping to keep the numbers down during the Covid crisis. They currently had three staff members out that were Covid positive. They had tested about 178 employees and they were doing a good job of keeping it out of the jail as far as inmates go.

ORDINANCE -20

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS WITHIN AND IN CLOSE PROXIMITY TO THE MORE DENSELY POPULATED AND SENSITIVE AREAS OF UNINCORPORATED HORRY COUNTY AND OTHERWISE REGULATING THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS AND MECHANICAL DEVICES.

WHEREAS, in recognition of the increased density of population in certain areas of the County, the dangers inherent in the use of firearms and certain mechanical devices, the noise levels associated with the discharge of firearms, and having received ongoing complaints concerning the discharge of firearms, County Council believes that an ordinance regulating the discharge of firearms within and in close proximity to the more densely populated areas and particularly sensitive areas of unincorporated Horry County, and regulating the careless discharge of firearms and certain mechanical devices, is in the interest of the health, welfare, and safety of the citizens, residents, and visitors of Horry County, domesticated animals, and the peaceable enjoyment of property; and

WHEREAS, although Council does not intend to encroach upon or limit in any way a citizen's Second Amendment rights, the South Carolina Legislature has provided the County the authority to regulate the discharge of firearms within the County's jurisdiction, and to enforce such regulation by way of criminal prosecution, so that citizens may exercise their Constitutional rights, but in a lawful and safe manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, by the power and authority granted to the Horry County Council by the Constitution of the State of South Carolina and the powers granted to the County by the General Assembly of the State, the following hereby is ordained and enacted:

1. CODE AMENDMENT. Section 13-11 (Reckless discharge of a firearm or other mechanical device) of ARTICLE I (IN GENERAL) of Chapter 13 (OFFENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS), Horry County Code of Ordinances, is hereby repealed, and is rewritten and replaced in its entirety. Section 13-11 shall hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 13-11. Discharging firearms and mechanical devices.

(a) *Definitions.* "Firearm" shall mean rifle, shotgun, handgun, pistol, machine gun, cannon, or similar instrument from or by means of which any bullet, shot, or other missile of any kind may be projected. "Mechanical device" shall mean potato gun, air gun, air nail gun or other device that will launch a projectile by any means of explosive substance to include flammable fluids, compressed air, gasses or powders manufactured or custom made.

(b) *Prohibited zones.* It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any firearm within a discharge prohibited zone. Discharge prohibited zones will be determined by Resolution of County Council upon submission to the Council of a petition signed by 50.1% or more of the registered voters residing within a defined area of the County or by request of the County Councilmember in whose district the defined area is located. To be designated a discharge prohibited zone, the defined area must fall completely within an urban area as defined by the most current U.S. Census report, and/or meets the definition of major residential development within the County's Land Development Regulations and property three hundred (300) feet from the boundaries of such major residential development.

(1) These prohibitions shall not apply to:

(A) conduct specifically provided for under Section 23-31-510 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976, as amended),

(B) a law enforcement officer or member of the armed forces of the United States in the performance of his or her lawful duty,

(C) an existing gun club or shooting range (as defined in the S.C. Shooting Range Protection Act of 2000), in operation on a regular basis since at least five (5) years prior to the establishment of a discharge prohibited zone, operating in full compliance with all applicable laws and regulations governing such activity, and operating according to the following:

(i) shooting must be undertaken and the range must be oriented so that downrange is no less than 135 degrees away from the direction of a discharge prohibited zone,

(ii) no firearm of a .50 caliber or greater may be used, and no tracer, incendiary, explosive, armor piercing, or penetrator ammunition may be used,

(iii) the range must be constructed and operated in substantial harmony with practices established by the National Rifle Association and/or the National Shooting Sports Foundation.

(D) in the lawful defense of persons or property,

(E) as part of a sporting event or theatrical, ceremonial, or military or similar event using blank ammunition and duly permitted by the County as a special event,

(F) a County sponsored or permitted special event, or

(G) upon a privately owned track of land or publicly owned wildlife management area, no less than five (5) acres in size, a legally licensed hunter acting lawfully under current State and federal law, and SC Department of Natural Resources or US Fish and Wildlife Service regulations, as applicable, while engaged in actual hunting, provided that care is taken that the trajectory of any rounds fired is not in the direction of any person, dwelling unit, or commercial establishment.

(d) *County owned property.* It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any firearm upon any County owned property or right-of-way.

(e) In addition, it shall be unlawful for any person in the unincorporated area of the county to intentionally, negligently, or carelessly discharge any firearm or mechanical device in a manner as to be likely to cause bodily injury or death to persons or domestic animals or damage to or destruction of property other than their own.

(f) In addition, it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any firearm between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., with the exception of conduct specifically provided for under Section 23-31-510 of the South Carolina Code, a law enforcement officer or member of the armed forces of the United States in the performance of his or her lawful duty, an indoor shooting range operating in full compliance with all applicable laws and regulations, or in the lawful defense of persons or property.

(g) Any person convicted who shall discharge a firearm or other mechanical device in violation of this Section, after properly investigated and determined by County Law Enforcement by way of eyewitness, photographic, video, or other relevant evidence, will upon conviction be guilty of a misdemeanor, and for a first conviction, or second conviction occurring within one year of the first, shall be subject to a fine of up to \$500.00 and/or imprisonment of up to 30 days. Upon a third or

subsequent conviction occurring within 1 year of the first, such person shall be subject to a mandatory fine of \$500.00 and imprisonment of 30 days.

(h) In addition, a property or business owner, or other person or legal entity in possession of or having control over real property, who permits, enables, promotes, contributes to, stages, conducts, organizes, sponsors, or allows conduct prohibited under this Section at such business or property will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to the same penalties set forth in sub-section (g), above.

2. SEVERABILITY. If any Section, Subsection, or part of this Ordinance shall be deemed or found to conflict with a provision of South Carolina law, or other pre-emptive legal principle, then that Section, Sub-section or part of this Ordinance shall be deemed ineffective, but the remaining parts of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

3. CONFLICT WITH PRECEDING ORDINANCES. If a Section, Sub-section or provision of this Ordinance shall conflict with the provisions of a Section, Sub-section or part of a preceding Ordinance of Horry County, unless expressly so providing, then the preceding Section, Sub-section or part shall be deemed repealed and no longer in effect.

4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall become effective on Third Reading.




Population Density

Housing Density


- Based upon County Building Footprints, updated in early 2017.







HCPD Calls for Service September 2020 (Council Districts)




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HCPD Calls for Service

September 2020 (10,581)





HCFR Incident Counts by Council District For September 2020


